DEAR FRIENDS OF GMHC. This past year will be remembered as one of the most challenging for non-profit AIDS service organizations across the country. Our resources have been very hard to come by while the demands on our staff and our services have continued to increase. In spite of these challenges, GMHC continued to provide a safe haven and a source of care and support for more than 15,000 men, women, and children—a number that grows every year.

Maintaining our success in supporting HIV-positive individuals has always required that we confront and overcome obstacles with fierce determination, that we provide limitless compassion for the welfare of others, and that we remain vigilant in the face of fear. Compassion has always been a vital component of the work we do; it is the cornerstone of our mission and propels us to improve the lives of our clients on every level. And it is what you demonstrate every year with your generous support and your advocacy for our work.

With your help last year, we worked diligently to help our clients achieve greater autonomy and self-worth by launching a transition-to-work program, by providing them with financial guidance and legal services, and by fighting to uphold their legal, civil, and human rights. Recognizing that new infections continue unabated and that there are increased numbers of HIV-positive people living longer, we emphasized defending and promoting prevention, securing access to care, and connecting people with long-term support services earlier. We made progress in HIV prevention for women, persons of color, and young people, and expanded our array of services to include rapid HIV testing as well as prevention and testing for Syphilis and Hepatitis, two infections that have increased and go hand-in-hand with HIV infection.

We continued to create targeted messages that make explicitly clear that HIV transmission can be prevented, and fiercely advocated on behalf of those most at risk of HIV infection when the Federal Centers for Disease Control questioned the efficacy of condoms. We also fought against the federal government's insufficient funding of domestic AIDS programs and its hyperscrutiny of organizations—like ours—that use explicit language and approaches in their prevention initiatives.

Determination, compassion, and vigilance are critical to our success—but they are nothing without your generosity. Our work is made possible only through the impact of your financial support, your commitment, and your ongoing efforts to end this plague. The people listed in the back of this report, and thousands more, represent a collective altruism and devotion that is truly inspirational.

It gives me comfort and confidence that, together, we will win this fight. I hope that the hard work of our staff, our volunteers, and our partner organizations demonstrate our gratitude and appreciation to you, our supporters, every day of the year. Thank you!









### GMHC INTERVENES IN THE LIVES OF THOSE MOST AT RISK FOR HIV TRANSMISSION QUICKLY, EFFICIENTLY, AND SUCCESSFULLY

Intervening in the lives of those most at risk for HIV transmission early on, with vigorous, effective, and successful prevention strategies remains an invaluable part of our mission. GMHC spent the last fiscal year focusing its priorities on engaging communities in New York City with populations that are the most at risk for becoming infected with HIV, including: young people, communities of African, Caribbean, Latin and Asian descent, gay, and homosexually-active men and women, and immigrants. Connecting these communities with HIV testing and prevention earlier than ever before allowed us to interrupt the progression of HIV disease, prevent additional transmission, and enhance the quality of their lives.

After fighting for (and winning) increased accessibility to rapid HIV testing technology, GMHC launched the rapid test (with results in 20 minutes) during National HIV Testing Week in June. GMHC's David Geffen Center for HIV Prevention and Health Education's extensive targeted outreach around this new technology—which included extensive referrals from trained volunteers on our AIDS Hotline—led to a significant jump in the number of tests taken and enhanced our ability to offer early intervention. Because the rapid HIV test is fully integrated into GMHC's already successful testing and counseling model, we increased people's knowledge about their HIV status, armed them with the information they need to stay healthy, and connected them to appropriate services and care with efficiency and ease.

Prevention for HIV-positive people is also an important part of what we do. For example, GMHC's Prevention Case Management program enrolls HIV-positive men who have sex with men (not all of whom identify themselves as gay) and who are active drug users, in an intensive three-month program where they receive counseling and support in an effort to stabilize their lives. Many of these men are unable to access care, and are woefully lacking resources to maintain their health. While enrolled in the program, they are connected to HIV-positive peer buddies who assist them in navigating and accessing resources in and out of GMHC.

The goal of GMHC's Institute for Gay Men's Health is to promote the well-being of gay men in a way that promotes HIV prevention as part of sexual health. Through rigorous participation in a number of social and behavioral research activities over the past year, the Institute was successful in enhancing and targeting its prevention messages and services to the communities it serves—black, Latino, Caucasian, and gay men, as well as young people involved in the House and Ball community. Through widespread individual outreach in bathhouses, clubs, and on Fire Island, the Institute's trained volunteers disseminated condoms and information about how to avoid HIV, Syphilis, and Hepatitis. In addition, the Institute conducted critical workshops addressing the risks associated with sexual activity and substance use (like crystal methamphetamine and sex); hosted monthly Friday Forums that provided opportunities for respected researchers to have honest medical discussions of best practices in prevention and treatment with the public; and spearheaded "street level" research of sexual behavior that generated enormous amounts of data that will help us develop the next generation of programs.

The Women and Family Services Department continued to break new ground in HIV prevention, creating important education and advocacy partnerships with sister organizations in the community. The department distributed over 18,000 safer sex kits to women, along with education materials, and referrals to care. GMHC's women-focused services addressed the complex issues that affect women's ability to access HIV care and remain in care, such as poverty, domestic violence, substance use, parenting and child care. The Child Life Program provided critical support for families who face the multiple challenges of child-rearing, family re-integration, HIV disclosure, and permanency planning. Child Life also helped families strengthen their networks of support in order to help alleviate the stigma and discrimination they experience around HIV and AIDS. Marking its 10th year, the Lesbian AIDS Project continued to be one of the few programs in the country to address the specific HIV education, prevention and support needs of lesbians and other women who have sex with women.

### GMHC SUSTAINS AND ENHANCES THE QUALITY OF LIFE OF PEOPLE LIVING WITH HIV AND AIDS

The struggle to sustain and enhance the lives of people living with HIV is complex and filled with obstacles. Advances in therapies have made it possible to live longer, but not necessarily with greater ease. Thousands of people struggle daily to adhere to medical protocols and gain access to medical care while fighting the paralyzing stigma attached to HIV. This struggle is often compounded by socio-economic factors such as discrimination based on race, nationality, immigration status, gender, sexuality, and poverty. GMHC continued to confront the totality of emerging demands of the AIDS epidemic by working to ensure that every man, woman, and child has the highest level of access to life-saving treatments and the support needed to make those treatments successful.

One common denominator among our vastly diverse client population is their poverty—last year, 77% of GMHC clients received an income of less than \$10,000 a year. Struggling to raise a family, keep a home, or find employment, substantially decreases the ability to sustain one's health. GMHC's financial advocacy services continued to help clients stabilize their lives by assisting them in securing and retaining housing through rental support, eviction interruption, financial management and utilization of the Sustainable Living Fund (which helps to prevent homelessness among impoverished immigrants). We also worked with clients to maintain and increase their access to health care and health insurance, and assisted them in navigating the complicated maze of income support, benefits, and entitlements. This past year, GMHC expanded these services through its coordination of the Sustainable Living Fund for the City of New York.

GMHC's successful Meals Program continued to operate above capacity, and provided clients and families with nutritious meals and social support. The socializing benefits of the Meals Program add to the existing resources available through our Life Steps programs including scholarships, books from the client-run lending library, and free theatre tickets from the Jerry Herman Theatre Desk. To help families face the difficult challenges of living with AIDS, GMHC provided individual and group support to family members coping with the sensitive issue of HIV disclosure. In addition, our Child Life Program helped families by providing child-sitting services, nutrition counseling, and nourishment through our Elizabeth Ross Johnson food pantry.

GMHC recently refurbished the popular Rachel Berger Treatment Library—which experienced a marked 300% increase in usage last year. The Treatment Library offers computer and print resources that detail the most advanced protocols in HIV treatment. The Library also provides training to clients on how to successfully access information on the Internet. In conjunction with the Library, GMHC increased access to treatment adherence resources, women-centered treatment options, and created new wellness publications, such as "Ten Ways to Take Care of Yourself When You Have HIV Disease." The training and work component of the Terry K. Watanabe Volunteer and Work Center was launched this year to provide education, vocational training, computer-skill application, college scholarships, and on- and off-site internships for clients who are physically and emotionally ready to transition to work or enter the work force for the first time.

Our clients face many legal obstacles which have increased in number and complexity after the tragic events of September II, 2001. Last year, our specially trained legal and client advocacy teams helped more than 3,000 people resolve their legal issues with legal counsel and/or representation in the fields of landlord/tenant, family and domestic unity law, immigrant legal rights, permanency planning and employment discrimination. In addition, clients were provided with assistance in the areas of Supplemental Security Income and Social Security Disability Insurance, estate planning, bankruptcy, and private disability insurance.

Through the coordinated efforts of our programs, GMHC continued its concerted effort to meet the increasingly complex needs of HIV-positive men, women, and children. Our wellness philosophy and approach emphasizes life affirmation and self sufficiency, and continues to shape and influence the services we offer, resulting in increased autonomy, self-reliance, and stability in the lives of the people we serve.

### GMHC'S PUBLIC POLICY WORK BENEFITS THE LIVES OF EVERYONE INFECTED OR AFFECTED BY HIV AND AIDS

It has long been GMHC's mission to amplify the voices of HIV-positive people so that they can better achieve meaningful change in their lives through grassroots organizing, lobbying, and effective advocacy. In addition, GMHC has field firm to the belief that federal, state, and local governments must keep HIV and AIDS prevention and care a fully-funded priority. This past year, GMHC's public policy actions reached all levels of government to defend, protect, and maintain the stream of resources available to HIV-positive people and their right to a quality life.

By leading a demonstration last July at the XIV International AIDS Conference in Barcelona, GMHC issued a loud salvo in the HIV/AIDS community's ongoing battle with the federal government to demand that more attention be paid to domestic and global AIDS issues. The demonstration was just one example of GMHC's national leadership role in forming and maintaining significant coalitions of AIDS organizations, like the AIDS Action Council, whose Board GMHC chaired during the year, and the Federal AIDS Policy Partnership (FAPP), of which GMHC is a founding member. Through its leadership roles in AIDS Action Council and FAPP, and through its membership in organizations like the National Minority AIDS Council and Cities Advocating for Emergency AIDS Relief (CAEAR) Coalition, GMHC influences federal AIDS public policy on issues of prevention, research, treatment, care, and housing. One highlight of the year was organizing—in tandem with our coalition partners—several days of extensive lobbying in Washington, D.C. on HIV prevention, Medicaid, and federal funding.

During the year, GMHC responded vigorously to shifts in federal HIV/AIDS public policy that threatened to undermine an effective response to the epidemic. GMHC established and chaired the HIV Prevention Defense Working Group, which challenged lawmakers and government officials to protect the value of current HIV prevention strategies. As part of this important fight, GMHC remained strongly opposed to the federal government's attacks on HIV prevention, such as its heavy focus on abstinence as the primary means of preventing HIV and other sexually transmitted infections. We also worked with our local partners that were targeted by the federal government for punitive financial audits—an imminent threat to all organizations who promote condoms as an effective means of HIV prevention, and who use sexually realistic approaches in their prevention messages. The impact of the events of September II, 2001, and a sluggish economy continued to be exhibited in state and citywide fiscal fatigue, increased unemployment, and pervasive budget tightening. Mindful of both the reality of reduced resources and increasing needs of people affected by AIDS, GMHC renewed its fight against dramatic cuts in essential federal, state, and local AIDS funding—like Medicaid, the AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP), and funding for communities of color—successfully preventing potentially devastating shortfalls in services and health care for thousands of men, women, and children.

GMHC's Public Policy and Volunteer Departments, in conjunction with the Open Society Institute, brought interns to GMHC from various countries in Eastern Europe as part of the Eastern European Fellowship Program. The fellows brought valuable insights to GMHC and received important on-site training in treatment advocacy, grassroots organizing, and service provision. Bringing these skills back to their home countries, the fellows in the program increased the capacity of their regional AIDS organizations.

GMHC actively works to empower its clients with information and resources to better manage their own care. On the front lines of the effort to make Medicaid enrollment and coverage stipulations "user friendly," GMHC continued to offer its SNiP Tips—a user's guide to New York State's Medicaid Special Needs Plans. GMHC also continued to hold workshops and forums every week to help clients understand the complicated system of health entitlements and eligibility. Similarly, GMHC's flagship publication, Treatment Issues, offered scholarly information on HIV treatment options, advocacy, and policy. The men, women, and children affected by HIV and AIDS, both here and around the world, are all too often the people least likely to have their voices heard or their needs met. Through sophisticated, passionate, and committed public policy analysis and advocacy, GMHC continued to assist HIV-positive people and people living with AIDS in their efforts to be heard.

### GMHC PROGRAM GUIDE

ON THE FRONT LINE IN THE FIGHT AGAINST HIV AND AIDS SINCE 1981, GMHC CONTINUES TO REFINE AND DEVELOP ITS COMPREHENSIVE SERVICES TO PROVIDE AN UNPARALLELED CONTINUUM OF CARE FOR OUR CLIENTS. PRINCIPLE PROGRAMS OF THE AGENCY INCLUDE:

THE DAVID GEFFEN CENTER FOR HIV PREVENTION AND HEALTH EDUCATION: The Geffen Center combines a highly successful HIV and STI testing and counseling program with immediate connection to care. It also provides programs that empower clients with the knowledge to maximize their well-being in the context of broader health concerns.

THE GMHC HOTLINE: The GMHC hotline responds to over 35,000 phone calls and email requests yearly with detailed information, emotional support, and an expansive referral service.

THE MICHAEL PALM CENTER FOR AIDS CARE AND SUPPORT: The Palm Center offers a full range of early engagement and linkage to services, including adult mental health, case management, support groups and in-home buddy services.

WOMEN AND FAMILY SERVICES: Women and Family Services focuses on addressing the full range of issues facing women and families at risk for, or living with, HIV and AIDS. It also includes specific prevention, outreach, and support for lesbians through the Lesbian AIDS Project. The Child Life Program offers a wide range of family health and nutrition services, including a widely-used food pantry.

<u>THE INSTITUTE FOR GAY MEN'S HEALTH:</u> The Institute for Gay Men's Health uses community-specific outreach and networking to connect gay and bisexual men with safer sex information, substance use education, counseling, workshops, and discussion groups, to reduce HIV transmission.

CARE MANAGEMENT: Care Management provides a health care safety net for clients at high risk of losing essential services and resources through assistance with housing, food, financial benefits, and medical care.

<u>LEGAL SERVICES AND CLIENT ADVOCACY</u>: Legal Services and Client Advocacy offers services critical to obtaining and maintaining access to food, housing, medical care and employment. Client Advocacy assists clients in navigating their HIV public benefits and health care insurance.

<u>THE TERRY K. WATANABE VOLUNTEER AND WORK CENTER:</u> The Watanabe Center is a hub for volunteers and offers a comprehensive array of educational, job readiness, training, job placement and supportive retention services for people living with HIV/AIDS.

<u>PUBLIC POLICY:</u> Public Policy advocates for fair and effective AIDS policies at all levels of government and for expanded access to health care and services.

TREATMENT AND PREVENTION ADVOCACY: Treatment and Prevention Advocacy focuses the agency's advocacy efforts on the development of new, better, and less expensive methods for the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of HIV and AIDS.



As our family of clients expands—now more than 15,000 men, women, and children—so do our needs for the continuing generosity of our family of friends and supporters. A strong indication of our efficient use of resources is that 81.3% of expenses go to support our programs—and the vast majority of our donors' contributions were directly allocated to client services.

In these challenging times, the GMHC Board of Directors continues to invest in the financial and operational infrastructure of the agency through leadership, partnership, and support to achieve the highest levels of cost-efficiency with our private and public resources. We remain committed to exploring new sources of revenue that complement our mission while serving the changing needs of our clients, thereby sustaining our proud tradition of leadership, efficacy, and success in the fight against HIV and AIDS. Thank you for your continued confidence in the fiscal management of GMHC.
